as the one that enlisted him  
Here is another pen this is not  
good gold Composition  
I think the other is a good  
one

I shall soon be a g g m's  
man. & then time will pass  
slow I'm thinking but it  
cannot last long

I had to get me a pair of  
suspenders to keep up my  
pants (I got the money of  
W. Green) & they are not good  
for any thing for me as they  
are not strong enough but  
will be good for Father

They are a little dirty, it  
came from my coloured shirt  
but it will wash off  
I will send them home one  
at a time in papers  
When did they change the  
postage on papers  
I did not know any thing  
about it. I got Flag & You  
yesterday with acct of McKay  
death in it. He was not shot  
for any particular good he  
was down But I must  
stop Furloughs are played  
out here But I must  
stop yours Truly
